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SUMMARY OF OCCUPATIONAL INJURIES AND ILLNESSES MUST BE COMPLETED AND POSTED BY FEB 1ST

Part 801 of §27-a of New York State Labor Law sets forth that a Log and Summary of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses is a recordkeeping requirement of the New York State Public Employees Safety and Health Act.

Log:

Throughout the calendar year, all OSHA-recordable employee injuries and occupational illnesses must be entered on the Log of Work-Related Injuries and Illnesses (Form SH-900).

Annual Summary:

At the end of each calendar year, employers must fill out the Summary of Work-Related Injuries and Illnesses (Form SH-900.1). **A copy of the 2017 Summary must be posted in each school facility from February 1 through April 30 in a conspicuous place where employee notices are posted.** The Summary, using the average number of employees and total hours employees worked for the previous year, includes calculated rates of injury, illness and lost time. These rates can be compared to rates from similar facilities and to national data.

Failure to comply with the above requirements is a violation of New York State labor law and may result in appropriate enforcement action by the New York State Depart-

ment of Labor.

TIER II Reporting Requirements



Facilities covered by the Emergency Planning and Community Right to Know Act (EPCRA) must submit an emergency and hazardous chemical inventory form annually to the Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC), the New York State Emergency Response Commission (SERC) and the local fire department. New York State requests that each facility submit a Tier II form. Tier II forms require basic facility identification information, employee contact information for both emergencies and non-emergencies, and the following information about chemicals stored or used at the facility:

- The chemical name, CAS number or the common name as indicated on the Safety Data Sheet (SDS)
- An estimate of the maximum amount of the chemical present at any time during the preceding calendar year and the average daily amount
- A brief description of the manner of storage of the chemical
- The location of the chemical at the facility
- An indication of whether the owner of the facility elects to withhold location information from disclosure to the public

School districts with on-site bulk petroleum storage will likely trigger the threshold for reporting requirements. Tier II Reports are required to be filed by March 1st each year.

Shovel Out For Fire Safety

Maintenance and grounds staff are reminded to keep **all** exits clear of ice and snow to provide adequate means for escape during emergencies. Any doors designated as exits should be kept clear at **all** times while buildings are occupied. A continuous path from the exit to a parking lot, street, or sidewalk should be maintained as well.

Make sure that staff members pay special attention to fire lanes, fire hydrants, and sprinkler connections too. Ensuring that all of these areas are clear of snow and ice will enhance fire safety and property protection for school districts.



Seasonal Flu Information for Schools

Flu season is upon us, and this year's flu strain is particularly virulent. Encourage your students, parents, and school staff to take the following preventative actions:

- Encourage students, parents, and staff to get a yearly flu vaccine.
- Stay home when you are sick. If possible, stay home from work, school, and errands when you are sick. You will help prevent others from catching your illness. Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue away after use and wash your hands. If a tissue is not available, cover your mouth and nose with your sleeve, not your hand.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water, especially after you cough or sneeze. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, or mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces or objects. Clean and disinfect frequently touched surfaces at home, work or school, especially when someone is ill.

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with the firm named, has announced a voluntary recall of the following product. Consumers should stop using this product unless otherwise instructed. It is illegal to resell or attempt to resell a recalled consumer product.

December 12, 2017

Hazard:
The rollover protective structure (ROPS) at the back of the tractor can loosen and fail to protect the operator in a rollover accident, posing a risk of injury.

Incidents/Injuries:
No incidents/injuries have been reported.

Description:
This recall involves John Deere model 1023E and 1025R compact utility tractors. They are green and yellow with "John Deere" and the model number printed on the hood of the tractor. The serial number is located on the right side of the frame by the front right tire.
